RuPaul's Drag Race earned a nomination for Outstanding Reality/Reality-Competition Program at the 69th Primetime Emmy Awards on Sunday, September 17, 2017, at the Microsoft Theater in Los Angeles, California. The Voice, a musical competition show, won. RuPaul Charles (b. 1960) won his first Emmy last year for Outstanding Host of a Reality/Reality-Competition Program and took home the same award at the Creative Arts Emmy Awards this year. The show also won Emmys for Outstanding Picture Editing for a Structured or Competition Reality Program and for Outstanding Costumes for Variety, Nonfiction, or Reality Programming. RuPaul not only won an award at the 69th Emmy Awards but also was an award! The RuPaul's Drag Race host appeared in a short segment in the middle of the awards show as "Emmy," the personification of the night's true star: the golden winged angel holding an atom. Sitting down with host Stephen Colbert, RuPaul dished on what it's like to a be a coveted Hollywood award and the relationship with other awards.



Easily one of RuPaul's greatest ventures is his Emmy award winning show RuPaul's Drag Race, currently in its 11th season. The popular drag competition pits queen against queen as they use their "Charisma, Uniqueness, Nerve and Talent" to display their musical, dance, acting and fashion prowess. Hosted by Mama Ru herself, she sits on a panel of judges including long time friend and fellow singer, Michelle Visage (season 3-present), fashion designer Santino Rice (season 1-6), television personality, Ross Mathews (season 7-present) and actor and fashion expert, Carson Kressley (season 7-present). The show also features different guest judges each week which have included names like Lady Gaga, Elvira, Chaz Bono, Adam Lambert and Neil Patrick Harris. The show features many of RuPaul's own music and is responsible for kickstarting more than 120 careers in drag. While there is never a shortage of drama on Drag Race, RuPaul, who is also an executive producer, never fails to highlight the tender moments that really capture the essence of RuPaul Charles. Acceptance, love, family and being true to who you are no matter what you look like.

Voted one of Time magazine's most influential people and being the first openly gay television host (The RuPaul Show, 1996) it isn't hard to see why Ru is a role model to millions around the world no matter their age, race, size or sexual orientation. Many of the queens who have appeared on RuPaul's Drag Race and its various spin off series come from homes where they are made to feel like they are abominations and unaccepted by parents who are supposed to love their children unconditionally. For those forced into church, conversion camps or made to hide who they are, RuPaul vehemently champions the ideals that everybody should love themselves and be true to who you are as a person. Another of his famous sayings is that gay people get to choose their families and build a tribe of those who will love and support them through thick and thin. "We're all born naked and the rest is drag." A phrase coined by Ru-Paul that screams for acceptance and equality. Everyone is born exactly the same way - naked. Everything that we put on afterwards, clothes, jewelry, makeup,

tattoos, is a form of self expression and should be celebrated no matter who you are, inside or out. Nobody can make you feel inferior without your consent and as RuPaul always says "If you can't love yourself, how in the hell are you going to love somebody else?"


FLORIDA PRIDE CANCEL - Craig Cox

The U.S. Postal Service celebrated Florida's gayest city with its own postmark. (1) The 2019 Wilton Manors Stonewall Pride Parade and Street Festival had a special one-day pictorial postmark on June 15th.

The Wilton Manors festival, which was organized by the Wilton Manors Entertainment Group, featured a colorful parade and entertainers on six stages, drawing thousands to Wilton Drive. The cost to attend was \$5.

The postmark featured the event's logo honoring the 20th anniversary of Wilton Manors Stonewall Pride and the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall riots in New York city, "which became the catalyst for the modern gay-rights movement". (1)

Craig Cox wrote, "Here's the postcard I made yesterday. The postmaster tells me this postmark is already very popular and he seemed surprised at all the requests he's been getting from around the country."

Most stamps I have found to be interesting one way or another. My love is for classic United States designs that show extraordinary detail. Those are the stamps I will forever love. There are a good number that I am totally indifferent towards – they simply are stamps that have been issued with no real connection to my life or hobby.

For the most part I don't collect modern postage – my focus is 1847 to 1940. There are a couple of stamps – two of which I have shown here; the Prevent Drug Abuse and Alcoholism stamps that I totally loath. These stamps send a very negative message that I find repugnant. I will not buy them as discount postage, nor will I ever use them on a mailing. Over the years I have shredded – I would guess about \$25 worth of them. Extreme? Yes, but it makes me feel better.

The AIDS and Harvey Milk stamps are on the other

end of the spectrum for me. I bought both in bulk when they were current and used them extensively on mailings. It made me feel good to use both stamps in the hope that in some small way they could influence someone's thinking or understanding of history. And every once in a while, I used them on mailings going to very conservative individuals in my orbit – just to make a social statement.

In a rather odd turn of events at the FLOREX 2018 show, I had three dealers either give me outright sheets of these stamps or charge me minimal amounts. From what I could gather from further conversation – they had a tough time selling them to the general public. Since they knew that I bought those stamps for use, I was the natural target for them to move the material. In a way, I find that sad, as it appears the general stamp collecting public is shunning two stamps that are meaningful to me. Upon reflection, those actions are not a lot different from how I handle the first two stamps discussed.

Frederick Fox - John P. Stefanek



Frederick Fox was a successful London milliner, probably best known for creating hats for Queen Elizabeth II for thirty years.

Frederick Donald Fox was born on 2 April 1931 in Jerilderie, Australia. At age nine he began designing hats for his mother and five sisters (he also had three brothers) to wear to church.

From 1949 to 1958, he apprenticed to milliners in Sydney, then moved to London to start work with milliner Otto Lucas. Later, he worked with Mitzi Lorenz and at Langee, which he subsequently took over in 1964. He also assumed the millinery business of Rose Vernier.



Frederick was already a well-known London milliner when he was first asked in 1968 to design hats to accompany Hardy Amies collections. He created five hats to complement Amies designs for Queen Elizabeth II's State Visits to Brazil and Chile in

1968. Later, he designed the stewardess helmets for the iconic film 2001: A Space Odyssey.

He was granted a Royal Warrant in 1974. In 1981 he started designing hats for younger women: Diana, Princess of Wales wore many during the mid-1980s. He included a fascinator, one of the first, in his 1999 collection.



Frederick was appointed Lieutenant of the Royal Victorian Order (LVO) in the Queen's Birthday Honors of 1999. He retired in 2002. His longtime companion of 53 years, fashion designer Murray Arbeid, died in 2011. Frederick Fox died on 11 December 2013.

Gay Ventures

A Philatelic Column - Larry Crain



Stamp collectors who are LGBT do not just collect LGBT topics. This column will cover two of the things I collect and what is intriguing about them.

I will lead a meeting of LGBT collectors at the APS/ATA national show in August in Omaha,

Nebraska. I hope many will attend. The meeting will probably be on Sunday, and I want it to include a show-and-tell.



Even simple things are fascinating collectible items. Above is the first perforated 7-sided stamp. It was issued in 2017 by Thailand. The first pentagonal (5-side with all sides equal) stamp was issued by Indonesia in 1997. An earlier 5-sided stamp (shaped like house) was issue by Malta in 1968. Although triangles were common, different shape throughout the world, the US didn't issue its first triangular stamps until 1997.

However, the Rattlesnake Island private post in 1966 issued air mail stamps for service from the island in Lake Erie which had no delivery by the US post office. A few months later the US post office ruled that mail with these stamps could not be carried in the US mail. The Post Office reasoned they looked too much like US postage, but agreed that triangular stamps would be acceptable.



From my Peace Corps days in Colombia, South America I gained a fascination about El Dorado, the mythical city of gold the Spaniards searched for. Well, it was not so mythical -- although exaggerated. It was in Colombia and the kingdom disappeared about 50 years before the conquistadors arrived.

The legacy of the mythical city has carried over to 34 US states that have post offices named El Dorado or a spelling variety. There are an additional seven countries with El Dorado offices.

The one in Illinois is particularly unique. It is the only one not named after the place. It was named after the two founders, Judge Samuel Elder and Joseph Read -- thus Elder-Reado. But when the railroad came through in the 1880s, the sign painter for the railroad corrected the spelling to Eldorado.

The town has further fame, a little-known fame. The rock group The Beatles came to the US in 1963 and first performed on the Ed Sullivan show. Yet it was not the first performance in the US for one of the Beatles, George Harrison. He had performed in the Eldorado VFW hall with a local group The Four Vests while visiting his sister in a town nearby.

So -- how or why did I get this information. By looking at my covers, wondering about what was there and going on the Internet to see what I could find.



Hardy was commanded to prepare a collection for Princess Elizabeth's 1952 tour of Kenya and South Africa. The tour was interrupted in Kenya by the death of her father, King George VI. Hardy's third wardrobe for Elizabeth, now Queen, was for the 1953 tour to Australia. His work for the Queen enabled



him to apply for a Royal Warrant ("By Appointment to Her Majesty the Queen"), which was granted in 1955. He was well established as one of the Queen's dressmakers by the end of the 1950s. Virtually all the clothes Hardy made for Queen

Elizabeth II were for the royal tours abroad.

In 1961 Hardy began designing men's suits for large clothing manufacturer/retailer Hepworths. He staged his first fashion show for men's wear at a house owned by Yurka Galitzine. A second, public show was produced in the Savoy Hotel for three hundred guests, including press. It was historic (only the second catwalk of menswear in the world), and the subsequent press coverage was enormous. His book *ABC of Men's Fashion* was published in 1964. He wrote another book in 1994, *The Englishman's Suit*.

In the 1960s and 1970s, Hardy spent more and more of his time designing menswear. Also, he was increasingly travelling to manage licensee business in the United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and Japan. As a result, Ken eventually took over managing all of the women's operations at Saville Row, including much of the design work, often with final approval by Hardy. The two worked with Stanley Kubrick to design costumes for the 1968 film 2001: A Space Odyssey.

In 1972, Hardy bought, rebuilt, and extended a schoolhouse with an attached cottage in Langford, Oxfordshire. Ken moved into the cottage. Hardy converted a barn into guest quarters and installed a tennis court.

In 1973 Debenhams bought Hardy Amies Ltd., paying off Hepworths in the process. A boutique was opened in Harvey Nichols to sell women's ready-to-wear clothes, particularly sporting and casual wear.



Another boutique was opened opposite Harrods. In 1980, Hardy bought his company back from Debenhams.

Queen Elizabeth II stood on the balcony of Buckingham Palace during her 1977 Jubilee celebration in a pink satin dress designed by Hardy Amies. She had worn the outfit earlier that Jubilee Day at St. Paul's Cathedral. For the Queen's official Silver Jubilee photos, taken by Peter Grugeon, she wore a Hardy Amies satin dress that was made for her 1972 visit to the Palace of Versailles. She also wore his bright turquoise wool dress when Pope John Paul II visited the United Kingdom in 1982. Diana, Prin-

In 1989, the Museum of London presented an exhibition entitled *Hardy Amies – a Couture House at Work.* He received his knighthood, KCVO (Knight Commander

of the Royal Victorian Order), in the same year.

Hardy was always close to his sister Rosemary, but she became his rock after Ken's death from cancer in 1996. Hardy was devastated when she also died before him. Sir Hardy Amies died on 3 March 2003.

Frida Kahlo, Artist (1907-1954), inspired generations of female artists, bisexual women, and people with disabilities.



She underwent many surgeries throughout her lifetime and her portraits portrayed the pain and suffering she endured. She was stricken with Polio at age six which caused a deformity to her right lower extremity. In 1925 she sustained multiple injuries in a vehicle accident and spent several months in bed recovering. This is when she began painting seriously. Of her 143 paintings, 55 are self-portraits.



Frida married Diego Rivera in 1929. Their marriage was tumultuous, with both having affairs with others, they separated, divorced once and remarried. A bisexual, Frida had affairs with both men and women. Her relationships with women have been said to include American painter Georgia O'Keeffe, American actresses Paulette Goddard, Maria Felix, and French painter Jacqueline Lamba.

Her painting Two Nudes in a Forest (1939) reflected



her attraction and love of women. The painting was originally entitled as "The Earth Itself" and was a gift Frida gave to her intimate girlfriend, Mexican movie star Dolores del Rio.

In 1939 while exhibiting her self-portrait "The Frame" at the Louvre, Frida met and had an affair

with Josephine Baker in Paris. Josephine Baker was a famous entertainer, known for her bold dance routines and revealing outfits, the most well-known was a skirt made from bananas. Frida was the first Mexican artist to be featured at the Louvre.



After a separation from Diego, Frida abandoned her feminine image, cut her hair short and dressed in

men's suits. In this self-portrait with a necklace, Frida depicted herself with a shadow of a mustache for the first time. Frida became the first Hispanic woman to be honored with a U.S. Postage Stamp in 2001.



In 1990, Frida became the first Latin American artist whose work broke the one-million-dollar threshold at Sotheby's with the sale of "Diego and I" (1949). In 2006 Frida's self-portrait "Roots" sold for \$5.62 million at Sotheby's, making her one of the highest selling woman artist.
