## Pride's Geography

For many of us in the LGBTQ+ community, going back well over 50 years, our Pride is directly tied into our Geography. The new Canada Post stamp issue on May 30, 2025, Places of Pride, is a beautiful and touching testimony to this truth.

As is their habit at Canada Post, the four stamps in this issue span both territory and culture across the Dominion. From the Truax gay bar in Montreal, to Hanlan's Point Beach in Toronto, to the Third North American Native Gay and Lesbian Gathering in Beausejour, Manitoba, to Club Carousel in Calgary, these images convey the depth and richness of the Pride Movement's origins for diverse groups of Canadians.

I strongly resonate with the colorful 70's era art motif used in the stamp illustrations. That was the decade of my high school and college years, and the rainbow just kept getting brighter and brighter!

For me, growing up in Orange County, California, our Pride Festival and our AIDS Walk were often in supposedly safer locations such as the University of California at Irvine or at Anaheim Stadium, due to the very strong conservative politics and anti-gay rhetoric in the county.

It felt liberating to find a safer geography to celebrate my Pride in festivals along the waterfront in Long Beach, or along Santa Monica Boulevard in West Hollywood. It was an example of how a few miles of distance translated into light years of acceptance and diversity.

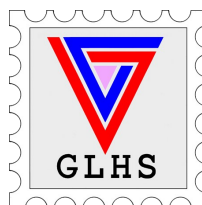
Over the years I have celebrated Pride in other parts of the continent as well. One that stands out is the Pride Festival at Tom McCall Waterfront Park in Portland, Oregon, developed in the 1970's as an early example of the urban freeway removal movement. Attending the Divers/Cite Festival in Montreal's Gay Village is another very colorful memory for me.

These days my husband and I reside in his hometown of Louisville, Kentucky. Being a blue island in a very red commonwealth, we have enjoyed a diverse geography of Pride in our city. The Belvedere, Big Four Park, our gay burg along Bardstown Rd, and more, are all a part of our Geography of Pride in Louisville.

After the mass shooting at Pulse in Orlando during the Pride season of 2016, our mayor in Louisville marched with all of us in our Pride Parade as a show of support and solidarity. Geography was reclaimed for Pride in a very courageous fashion.

How about the Geography of your Pride? Are there places and events which are part of your history? How about stamps which celebrate those landscapes and moments? Hopefully Canada Post's wonderful stamp set will be an inspiration for others in the years ahead!
